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### CHESTNUTS

Chestnuts have been learning about the life cycle of a butterfly and were very excited when we collected worms for the wormery which we have in our classroom. They have also brought in pictures with people that are special to them - they have taken turns in telling their peers why the people are special.



### WILLOW

In Willow Class, we have been learning about wheels, axles and chassis. We learnt how to attach wheels and axles to the chassis. Then, we designed our Police car and started making them. We had two parent visitors to our class, to link with our theme, **'People** 

who help us'. One brought a guide dog in and talked about how she helps to train him and the other was a nurse. She showed the children how to put a bandage on and how to hear their hearts beating. In R.E. the children have learnt about the Easter story. They painted pictures of Jesus on the cross.



### **SYCAMORE**

Sycamore have been busy these last few weeks. We have moved into the Iron Age and learnt about hill forts, we continued this in Outdoor Learning too. We have made a

template for our sewing and begun to stitch material together to create our pouches. We have continued learning our times tables in Y2 and fractions in Y3. During French, we have been counting and in PSHE we discussed what we can do when we feel angry. Our key question in RE this term is **'Why does Easter matter to Christians**?' This began with a recap of what we know about the Easter story. Looking forward to sharing our recorder skills with you next week in our concert.



### OAK

Oak class has been exploring a community action project run by the Diocese. We've been working towards getting our 'Archbishops' **Young Leaders Award'**. We're looked at various community projects around the world, and last week designed a project to help support our local community -look out for more on this to come soon. In English we have been sharing the story **'Owl moon'** and we've looked in depth at the characters and their relationships and how language choice has manipulated this.

Following on from our Safer Internet Day, during which we discovered many children enjoy gaming online, here is some advice from NSPCC on how to ensure your child is safe online when gaming.

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## **Understanding online games**

Online games can be a great way for children and young people to keep busy and stay in touch with friends and family, but it's important that they play safely.

Things to consider if your child games online:

- age ratings of games they play
- messaging and contact functions on the games
- in-game purchases
- trolling, griefing and scams
- how to report problems
- where they can get further support.

Also, if you have more than one child in your home, be aware that games suitable for one child to play or watch, may not be suitable for another.



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## Talk to your child regularly



<u>Talk to your child</u> about staying safe online, take an interest in the games they're playing and see if you can play them together and agree which ones are appropriate.

If you're going to set limits on the amount of time a child can spend playing games, make sure these are clear and that you agree them together. You could try agreeing the number of rounds your child plays instead of a length of time.

Take time to play games with your children so that you can understand the features. You can find out if there is anything concerning you need to be aware of, or safety features or parental controls which should be enabled.

- Ask why they like playing the game?
- Discuss who they're playing with. Do they know everyone on their contact or friends list? Explain that conversations should only be about the game, and if someone starts asking them other questions or suggests they speak using another app they should tell you or an adult they trust.
- Talk to them about what they're sharing. Use examples that are easy for them to understand, such as "You shouldn't give your number or any other personal information to somebody you don't know on the street. Is somebody online you don't know any different?"
- Discuss in-game purchases with your child. These can be really enticing, it's important to discuss that small amounts of money can add up very quickly. If you do allow your child to purchase items within the game discuss limits or set up their device so that purchases are turned off.

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We are holding a **Scholastic Book Fair** in school during Parents Evenings. A percentage of all book purchases in school will be donated to building up the school library so please have a browse when you visit and consider purchasing a book for your children.

## **TOAST BAR**



Unfortunately, we are currently not covering our costs with Toast Bar, due to the huge drop in donations towards funding it. As a Church school, and as a Kind school, we won't let anyone go hungry, regardless if they have paid, but, since we made paying non-mandatory, payments have dwindled. Alongside this, the cost of bread, butter and electricity have risen, leaving us in deficit. A slice of toast mid-morning is a great boost for children and we would like to continue. Please pay if you are able to- either 20p daily or a £1 a week. You can pay for a term if you like- please talk to Anna in the office.

However, if we do not cover our costs, toast bar will cease.
